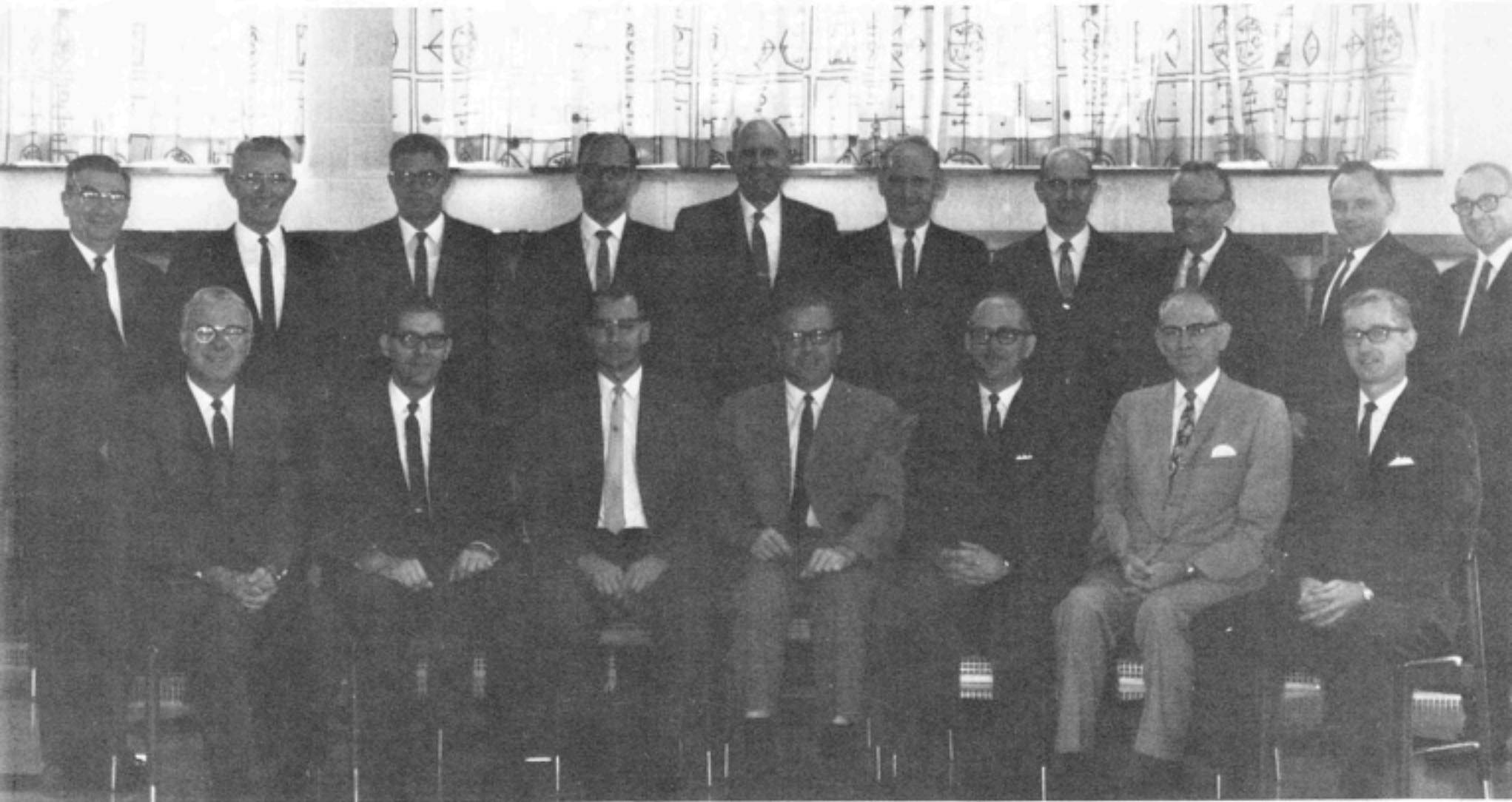
The experiences of men and women in the past have shown, and will continue to show in the future, that God's way is the best way. The prayer of our faculty is that you will choose to make God's way your way.
